Graduate Assistantships and/or Graduate College Tuition Scholarships are available to qualified full-time students who are working toward a graduate degree at UNI. Graduate Assistantship positions are offered at full-time (20 hours per week) or at half-time (10 hours per week) and paid a monthly salary for services rendered. Graduate College Tuition Scholarships are offered at half tuition scholarships or full tuition scholarships and are applied to a student's u-bill.

Academic Performance

Course Load: The maximum graduate student load during each semester of the academic year is 15 hours. The maximum graduate student load during the eight-week summer session is 9 semester hours of eight-week courses. The maximum load for shorter sessions is one (1) credit hour per session week (i.e., a 4 hour load in a four-week session; a 6 hour load in a six-week session). The maximum load during a two-week post-session is 2 semester hours.

Grades: No more than six (6) semester hours of *C* credit (*C+*, *C*, *C-*) may be applied toward credit for graduation. When *C* range grades on the advisement report exceed the six hour limit, one or more of such courses *must* be repeated. Individual departments may identify specific courses within the degree for which a minimum grade of *B* is required. A course taken to satisfy degree requirements in which a student receives a *D+*, *D*, *D-* or *NC* grade will not be considered satisfactory and *must* be repeated. The original grade for any repeated course will be included in the computation for the Plan GPA, as well as in the overall cumulative GPA.

Non-Graded Credit: Up to 3 credit hours of graduate non-graded (credit/no-credit) course work may be applied to the degree with the approval of the program and the Graduate College. Exceptions are courses offered only on a non-graded basis and 299/6299, which must be graded credit. A grade of *C*- or better is required to earn credit. Credit/no-credit will not be used to circumvent the maximum 6 hours of *C* grades applied to the degree.

Probation and Suspension: Students with unsatisfactory performance are placed on probation or are suspended from graduate degree programs and any graduate enrollment at UNI. Students are evaluated for probation and suspension based on attempted degree hours. Attempted degree hours are any credit hours on the advisement report for which the student receives a mark (A through F, W, I, RC, CR, NC) or for which the term and dates of the course have passed, even if there is no mark. 9-17 credits taken- GPA less than 3.00= probation

18+ credits taken- GPA less than 3.00= suspension

Transfer Credit

Graduate credit earned at other regionally accredited colleges and universities may be accepted to a maximum of one-third of the minimum number of hours required by a particular UNI graduate degree program, but specialist and doctoral programs may allow a smaller fraction of transfer hours. Credits earned from other institutions will not satisfy the minimum 200/6000-level course requirement or 200/6000- 300/7000-level requirement for doctoral degrees. Credits not needed to meet degree requirements will not be transferred. Transfer credit is not processed for students in non-degree status at UNI. A student pursuing a graduate degree program should discuss plans to transfer credits with the graduate program coordinator as soon as possible. Academic departments are not obliged to count toward their degree programs any credit for course work undertaken without specific advice provided by the department. However, prior to departmental evaluation of the course for use on the UNI graduate degree program, all transfer courses must satisfy the following criteria established by the Graduate Council:

1. Course must be a regular graduate course with a graduate course number (not professional development or college credit earned through an Educational Agency or conference).
2. Course must be taken by the student in graduate status and the official transcript must show a grade of B- or better earned.
3. Course must be applicable as a graduate requirement at the institution where it is taken.
4. Course must be taught by regular graduate faculty.
5. Course must meet the UNI seven-year recency requirement or the UNI ten-year recency requirement for the Ed.D.

A Graduate Transfer Form must be completed for each course a student wishes to transfer, including courses taken prior to admission to the UNI graduate program, unless the course is on a transcript from Iowa State University or the University of Iowa (see <https://grad.uni.edu/graduate-college-forms>). Students considering taking a course at another institution to use on the UNI degree should complete the Graduate Transfer Form and receive the result from the department prior to enrolling for the course. Transfer courses taken after degree admission will not be processed or approved for the degree until a Graduate Transfer Form is completed and returned to UNI from the other institution and official transcripts for these courses are filed with the Office of Admissions.

Recency Deadlines

Time limits on the completion of a degree, known as the recency deadline, have been established to ensure that a student who earns a UNI degree is current in the discipline at the time of graduation. The allotted time to a Master's, Specialist or Doctor of Industrial Technology is seven years from the earliest course applied to the degree. The allotted time for the Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) is 10 years.

Graduate Student Requests

The Student Request System for graduate students is online and available through MyUNIverse under the My Page tab in the Student Center pagelet. To initiate a request click on the Student Request (Grad Stdts) link then follow the instructions to write, submit and review the approval status of the Student Request. Graduate students *must* file requests via the online system; paper requests are not acceptable and will not be processed by the Graduate College or Registrar's Office. Please discuss the situation of your request with your advisor and/or graduate coordinator before you submit any Student Request.

There are many Student Request types which are listed below designated by a letter. It's important that students choose the correct request type. The most commonly used requests that are related to coursework include, F, M and N.

- A – Change Registration: Add course or change course credits after the deadline for the current term
- B – Change Registration: Add course or change course credits after the end of the term
- C – Change Registration: Drop course from current or future term
- D – Change Registration: Drop course after the end of the term
- E – Change Registration: Change course section after the deadline for the current term
- F – Substitute for required course in the degree
- G – Exception to Policy: Extension of 7-year time limit for degree completion/Waiver of recency
- I – Change Registration: Change course to/from ungraded credit after the deadline
- J – Change Registration: Change course to/from audit after the deadline
- K – Exception to Policy: Register for an overload
- L – Withdrawal from UNI after the deadline with 'W' for all courses
- M – Declaring electives for the degree
- N – Change to Thesis or Non-thesis option (Master's or Specialist degree)
- P – Graduate transfer course credit approval
- Q – Request registration in an undergraduate course
- Z – Other

Once a student files an online Student Request, it is sent to the student's advisor and graduate coordinator via email for review and approval. The Associate Dean of the Graduate College then reviews and approves the Student Request. The Office of the Registrar notifies the student via email regarding the progress of their request.

Thesis and Dissertation Information

Thesis and Dissertation Committee Approval Forms must be submitted electronically as soon as a student determines who will serve on their committee. To access the forms a student logs on with their CAT ID at <https://grad.uni.edu/thesis-dissertation-forms>. Other forms needed for final thesis and dissertation submission are available as fillable PDF forms on the same webpage.

The Thesis/Dissertation Preview must be completed no later than eight weeks prior to Commencement. The thesis and dissertation final submission deadline is five weeks prior to Commencement. Specific deadlines for each semester are posted on the Graduate College website at <https://grad.uni.edu/important-dates>.
